Anything But Cars, Saturday, April 23, all day beginning at 7AM.

The Anything But Cars (ABC) event on April 23, coordinated by **Dr**. **Alan Comen** (I'On Health), with a small army of volunteers will open the streets and parks of I'On Village to the possibilities of movement, recreation and exploration outside the automobile. The featured event is the first running of the **I'On Village Circuit Race**, a nationally sanctioned bicycle race. The entire day will be filled with activity you can participate in, watch or learn about. Everything is centered around Maybank Field, the Boathouse on Eastlake and Westlake's Water and Amphitheater. The event is presented by I'On BizNet, Inc., I'On's nonprofit community business association.

The highlight of Anything But Cars is the first running of the I'On Circuit Race, a series of bicycle races sanctioned by the US Cycling Federation and now the cornerstone of the SC Bicycle Racing Championship weekend here in Charleston. The races will begin with youth and amateur divisions earlier in the day. As the day goes on, the races get longer and faster, leading up to the final race between professional, sponsored teams, where speeds may reach 35 miles per hour on Ponsbury and other straight-aways vying for the \$12,000 in prize money.

There will be a Business Fair and Expo on Maybank Field, as well as kayak races, sailing on Eastlake, golf cart events, Segways, rollerblade, skateboard events, and others too numerous to mention here. The day will end with a free concert at the Westlake Amphitheatre with **TripleLindy**, a great band that's been featured at many local clubs.

Speed Limits Removed and I'On Streets Closed April 23rd for ABC Event. We all know that *20 is plenty in I'On...*but not on April 23rd. Authorized by special permit from the Town of Mount Pleasant, from 7 AM to 6 PM, the speed limit for selected streets in I'On will be removed entirely for the I'On Village Circuit Race. The condition and authority of the permit is that the streets be closed to traffic, and completely cleared of any parked vehicles during the race hours.

Therefore, the following streets will be closed to traffic and must not have any vehicles parked on the street from 7 AM to 6 PM on Saturday April 23rd:

- North Shelmore from Sowell to Ponsbury
- Ponsbury from North Shelmore to Sowell
- Sowell from Ponsbury to North Shelmore

During this time there will be very limited access onto and across these streets, so please plan accordingly. Expect delays of up to an hour if you want to use or cross these streets at all, and no vehicles will be allowed to park on the streets during these hours. Street access procedures and maps are available on the event website.

Any vehicles parked on the route at 7 AM will need to be removed (towed if necessary) to setup the safety bales and secure the course.

All other streets in I'On will remain open as normal...with normal speed limits...although extra traffic can be expected. So leave your car at home, and come out and enjoy Anything But Cars.

Practice Ride and Tune-up, April 7, 6PM at Maybank Field.

The public is invited to attend a bicycle racing "tune up". Participants will meet on Maybank Field on the West Side of Shelmore Blvd.

Members of the Lowcountry VW Racing team will inspect bicycles, provide safety pointers and lead participants on a low speed training ride through the streets of I'On and adjacent communities. The purpose of the training ride is to prepare for the upcoming Anything But Cars event and SC Bicycle Racing Championships in I'On.

All ages, all speeds, and any type of bike are welcome, so please bring out the family for this rare opportunity. Participants should bring a road worthy bicycle and wear a helmet. The event will benefit casual riders who want to improve their cycling efficiency as well as those getting ready to enter the upcoming races.

Identity theft-how can we prevent it? Submitted by Anonymous. In last month's newsletter, it said one of the residents had their identity stolen. It was mentioned that our trash makes us vulnerable. The position of our mailboxes also invites identity theft. Many of the mailbox clusters are tucked away on paths that are not easily observed. Think how simple it would be for a person looking to steal your identity by simply stealing your mail. At tax time your social security number is on all those W2's, 1099's and 1098's. Your monthly credit card bills list your account number in full on the statement. If you feel your mail is missing or has been tampered with, you may be a victim of identity theft. So not only should we be looking for people dumpster diving but also mail stealing! It's too bad in this day and age we must be ever on guard and cautious. Keep your eyes open and call the police if you see anything or person looking suspicious or out of the ordinary.



Free Attorney's Advice on Identity Theft:

- 1. Order your checks with your first initial and last name. If someone steals your checkbook, they will not know if you sign your checks with just your initials or your first name, but your bank will know how you sign your checks.
- 2. Do not sign the back of your credit cards. Instead, put "PHOTO ID REQUIRED".

- 3. When you write a check to pay a credit card, ONLY put the last four numbers. The credit card company will know the rest of the numbers.
- 4. On your checks, put your work phone number instead of your home phone number. Put your work address or P.O. Box number (if you have one) and not your home address. Never have your Social Security number printed on your checks (DUH!).
- 5. Place the contents of your wallet on a photocopy machine. Copy both sides of your license, credit cards, etc. Keep this photocopy somewhere safe so you have all the phone and account numbers.
- 6. When you travel, keep a copy of your passport with you (separate from your passport) and with someone at home that can be contacted while abroad.

What to do if your identity is stolen:

- 1. Cancel all credit cards immediately. The key is having the toll free phone numbers and all your account numbers.
- 2. File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where your credit cards, etc. where stolen. This proves to the credit providers you were diligent and is a first step toward an investigation.
- 3. Call the three national credit-reporting organizations (below) immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and Social Security number. The alert means any company that checks your credit knows your information was stolen and new credit can not be issued to anyone other than you.
