


I'On Design Committee

The Anatomy of an I'On Porch

The I'On Design Committee is often asked, "why can't I screen my front porch?" Traditionally, in the Lowcountry, the front porch was a gathering place on hot summer evenings in the hopes of catching a light breeze - an escape from the heat of the day still lingering in the home. It was furnished with rocking chairs, a swing and maybe a joggling board. Neighbors passing by would join the family and "sit a spell". It was here that stories were told and laughs were shared over a glass of ice tea. The family dog would languish in the shade and the family cat-with-attitude would balance on the porch rail daring anyone to get too close.

Porches in I'On continue this tradition. Railings are placed low to encourage conversation with those passing by. Screening is not a welcoming feature; it creates a boundary and limits interaction with the outside world. For this reason screening is not permitted in I'On on primary facades.

I On's Community Garden

Fall Gardens Y'all!

In October, the weather finally begins to cool, but that doesn't mean it is too late to plant garden edibles to last throughout the Fall and even through the Winter and Spring of next year. What are some good things to plant? In the Community Garden and your home garden as well, this is a good time to find cool weather plants at your favorite garden center. This is an easy way to grow some delicious food with little effort. But there are many things you can direct sow from seed now and throughout the month (try succession planting in intervals of every 2-3 weeks to extend your growing season). These are some community gardener favorites: herbs—chives, cilantro, dill, and parsley greens—lettuce, spinach, Asian greens brassicas—collards, kale,

chard, turnips, beets, broccoli, cabbage, radishes, and carrots. Most of these will grow through the winter, even in freezing weather if you add a deep layer of mulch (shredded leaves, compost, and straw are best) or grown under frost cloth or other protection. Don't have a garden? Try growing in containers in a sunny area of your yard or patio and enjoy fresh, wholesome food from your own home all winter.

Butterfly Fun



September and October are a great time to visit the butterfly garden. Beginning in September, the stars of the show are the bright orange Gulf Fritillaries, eagerly laying eggs on the plentiful passion vines at the garden. Other standouts are pre-migration Monarchs and jewel-toned Long Tailed Skippers (pictured to the left) along with buttery Clouded Sulphurs. We eagerly await the various purple asters (pictured to the right)

that bloom in profusion this time of year when many other flowers are gone or going. The climbing asters on the fence draw tremendous numbers and varieties of butterflies and other pollinators. It's as if they know the butterfly season has peaked, and they need to fatten up on as much nectar as they can before chilly weather signals the need to migrate, produce the last generation of caterpillars, or prepare to hibernate until Spring welcomes them once again.



Alison Papadopoulos and her three sons (pictured to the left) are frequent garden visitors and, according to Mom, the boys love to come to see all the butterflies. Her boys nodded gleefully then ran to inspect a Gulf Fritillary landing on a flower nearby. It is so rewarding to hear such positive responses about the garden, and all of you should come to see this special place. Residents of I'On can feel proud that the butterfly garden may help to inspire a new generation of children to love Nature and want to protect it.
