## Butterfly Garden

### Winter at the Butterfly Garden: Lessons Learned

By January, the butterfly garden is well past its prime with dead plants and faded flowers replacing the vibrant greens and vivid colors of summer. Surely one might think, it is time to “clean” and “tidy up” by cutting down most of the unsightly plants and removing dead leaves and other plant debris. I thought so until I had to learn how to care for our butterfly garden. In a nutshell, I have learned that a healthy butterfly garden should mimic nature, which does not always coincide with our “civilized” garden aesthetic. If you come by the garden before spring, you will find that most of the plants are still standing, dead flowerheads are uncut, and the ground is covered with leaf and plant litter. Here’s why:

After the summer, meeting the needs of butterflies, moths, other beneficial insects, and the plants themselves does not end. But the way we are taught to clean up our gardens is actually counterproductive to meeting those needs. Instead of cutting dead plants down, letting them remain (unless they are unhealthy) through the winter provides both shelter and food for wildlife. For example, plants with seedheads such as coneflowers, Black-eyed Susans, coreopsis, and sunflowers provide nutrient-rich seeds for birds such as cardinals, sparrows, chickadees, and jays. Late blooming or overwintering flowers such as asters, scarlet salvia, Marguerite daisy, and Turk’s cap provide nectar for the wasps, bees, moths, and butterflies that continue to forage during the winter months.

Standing plants, plant stalks, and leaves or other plant remains are also valuable as nesting sites and shelter for bees, ladybugs, and other beneficial insects. Many butterflies overwinter as eggs, pupae, or adults in leaf litter, dead or living plant stems, groundcover, or logs and branches.

Many plants also benefit from being left unpruned until spring. Azaleas, for instance, set their flower buds in the summer; pruning them in the fall or winter results in cutting off next spring’s flowers. Climbing asters look dead over the winter but bloom in the spring on what appeared to be dead wood. Leaving the tops of perennial flowers and grasses protects their bases and roots from freezing or damage during cold weather.

So be patient with us and the relative messiness at the garden that will meet your eyes during the winter months. Come spring, your neighbors on Team BG, who help care for the garden, will be there with rakes, clippers, and pruning shears as the plants and the creatures sheltering in the garden begin to come to life for another season.
