Butterfly Garden

Monarch Butterfly Migration Starts in March

After spending the winter in the oyamel forests of Mexico, Monarchs who migrated last Fall will begin their Spring migration back to the United States in March. The legendary migration of Monarch butterflies in the Fall is as long as 3,000 miles. Once they leave their mountain home in March, most enter the United States via Texas. After stopping to feed and reproduce, successive new generations move north through the Midwest and the South and eventually arrive as far north as Canada.

So when can we see Spring migrating Monarchs in Coastal South Carolina? We have had Monarchs at our butterfly garden as late as December and caterpillars as early as April. These are unlikely to be migrants. A little known fact is that there is a small non- migratory population of Monarchs that overwinters along the coast from Hilton Head to Georgetown. These unusual sightings at our garden are likely to be from this population. The Spring migratory population typically arrives here in significant numbers by May. (This newsletter will let you know when!)

The I'On Butterfly Garden is preparing now for their arrival. As a certified Monarch Waystation, we plant and maintain numerous varieties of mostly native plants that produce flowers that attract adult Monarchs and milkweed plants for their caterpillars. An abundance of milkweed plants is critical for Monarch survival because milkweed leaves are the only food their caterpillars can eat. Want to help Monarchs survive? Plant milkweed and support conservation efforts to grow milkweed along their migratory route including here in South Carolina.

I'On Community Garden

March Madness Community Gardener Style

Sorry sports fans, you no longer have a monopoly on the term "March Madness." We gardeners, at least here in the South, consider late February and March to be the months when many Spring crops are planted. Here at the I'On Community Garden, mild temperatures in March Increasingly edge out cold, rainy weather and beckon us to get down in the dirt to plant some tender lettuces and greens, sweet peas and carrots, as well as nutrient-rich brassicas such as broccoli and kale. Other garden favorites to plant at this time are quick-growing radishes and cool weather herbs such as cilantro and parsley. Such an abundance of good things to eat!

To prepare the garden for the new gardening year, pathways are freshly mulched, beds are weeded, and soil amendments are added to give our crops a healthy boost. Straw is available to mulch our plants as needed to discourage weeds, retain water, and eventually break down into compost. All that is needed now are new transplants and seeds, water, and TLC as our crops grow and mature for harvest.
