


The Formation Project is a survivor-founded and survivor-led nonprofit, providing direct services to survivors of human trafficking in the Tri- County area.

Recap of Creek Club Litigation Discussion

It was great to have so many come out on October 19th to hear our neighbors, Brad Walbeck and Lea Ann Adkins, along with their attorneys, Justin Lucey and Dabny Lynn. They shared their experiences and answered all of the audience's questions. We learned how some Olde Park homeowners were sold the right to use I'On's waterfront, why the promised community assets in early HUD documents were changed without notice, when the "perpetual access easement" rights ended, and why the difference between our crab docks and the deep water community dock is so important. There was agreement by those on the panel and in attendance that this story is must see information for I'On titleholders.

I'On Assembly Seeks Candidates

Each January, the I'On Assembly Board of Trustees elects three to four new board members to serve a twoyear term. This year, four (4) candidates will be elected for the 2024-2025 term. If you are interested in serving or have a neighbor you would like to recommend, current Board members are available between now and the January election to discuss the job responsibilities and share their lessons learned.

Serving on the board and volunteering for one of I'On's standing committees are great ways to get involved in the future direction of our neighborhood. While the time commitment varies based on issues which may arise, board members can expect to spend roughly two hours a week. The primary responsibility for all board members is to have an open mind when making decisions in the best interest of all 762 titleholders.

One of the best ways to get a feel for how the board operates is to attend one of the upcoming monthly meetings on November 13th and December 11th.

Joining the board requires filling out a <u>board application</u> by November 17th, so packets with ballots can be sent to Assembly members in December. Voting occurs in January and ends at our annual meeting in January.

Landscaping debris and large trash items are to be placed curbside for the Town of Mount Pleasant to pick-up. Trash items and landscaping debris are not to be placed at the street until Sunday evening or early Monday morning on trash day. Any debris or trash should not be placed in front of neighboring homes, on HOA/common property, nor should it block streets, alleyways or sidewalks.

If you have a landscaping company handling your landscaping, they are required by the Town, to haul away any debris they generate. We are continuously seeing landscaping debris and larger trash items being brought to the street prior to trash day, where it then sits for several days and on occasion entire weeks.

Landscaping debris/materials, soil, Christmas trees, etc. are not to be dumped along the marsh trail. It is important to follow the rule on when trash can be placed at the curb as it is unsightly for the neighborhood to have visible trash piles scattered throughout the community all week!

Sometimes it helps to double check with the Town to make sure the items you place at the street are items that they can pick up. Also, remind your landscapers to haul away any debris they generate.

If trash pick-up is ever missed, residents are to report that missed pick-up to the TOMP, or pull your items back in until the next pick-up. The items cannot be left at the street and cannot be left in the alleys. If the trash trucks ever miss something, please call TOMP Public Works at (843) 849-2022 to report missed pick-ups.

BUTTERFLY GARDEN

A Picture Can Be Worth a Thousand Words

In October and November the l'On Butterfly Garden on Eastlake Road is the site of a wonderful diversity of flowering plants and butterflies.

In planning the garden, mostly native plants that bloom in different seasons from early Spring to late Fall were selected to provide food, shelter, and host plants (plants their caterpillars can eat) for many local butterflies. Current late bloomers include the spectacular purple asters, scarlet salvia, various milkweed plants, goldenrod, and blue mistflowers in the photo to the left.

Among the butterflies to watch for are endangered Monarchs currently migrating into our area on their way to Mexico. Although most people are familiar with Monarchs, there are many other lovely butterflies this time of year that are little

known and less noticed by visitors to the garden. To raise awareness and provide identification of these other butterflies this newsletter will provide photos and names of some that have been recently observed. Treat your next visit to the garden as an opportunity to look around on the flowers carefully for these and additional butterflies stopping by for a visit. Many of them are small or less showy than the magnificent Monarch but still worth your time to get to know and appreciate. (See also October's newsletter.) I'ON COMMUNITY GARDEN

Mark Your Calendar: Signup for a Community Garden Plot Begins on January 1, 2024 by April Gordon

For most of us in I'On our yards are too small or too shady for gardening. Fortunately, I'On's Community Garden on Eastlake Road is a great alternative if you are interested in a place to grow your own fresh, organic vegetables, herbs, and flowers. Along with the satisfaction of growing things, community gardening gets people outdoors and active with family, friends, and neighbors. As a bonus, the garden is situated in a beautiful sunny location surrounded by the I'On Butterfly Garden with its diversity of flowering plants and abundance of bees, butterflies, birds, and other wildlife.

Plan now to get your garden plot for next year. Signup for our 27 raised beds (that are 5' x 8' in size) begins on January 1 on a first come, first serve basis to I'On residents. For only \$75 soil amendments, straw mulch, garden and planting information along with mulched pathways, perimeter fencing, and water are provided. The garden opens for planting in mid-February, and our growing season is year-round so you can enjoy those summer tomatoes and winter greens as well. Sign up individually, as a family, or partner with someone else.

WHAT'S UP WITH SOLAR?

The use of solar energy is one strategy for combating climate change. Our I'On ECO Group is advocating for this green energy source as one of our areas of focus.

Some homes in I'On have successfully adopted solar by having solar panels installed on their roofs. Many more residents may be interested in rooftop solar but are facing the current I'On Design Committee's prohibition on having panels that are visible from the street or common areas. The good news is that with the development of new technology, a policy revision is in the works and restrictions may be more flexible. Basically, the IDC will treat each request individually instead of referring to a blanket policy.

Meanwhile our group has been checking on trends in the industry and has identified two organizations that can provide helpful information. These are:

- Solar United Neighbors (www.solarunitedneighbors.org) an advocacy group that is national in scope and supports the use of solar energy.
- Palmetto Clean Technology (www.palmetto.com) an alternative energy company with a goal of using solar power across the country; they have an office in Charleston; they also have a group of employees who specialize in working with HOAs.

Our findings:

- Solar panels have to face either the south or the west to be effective.
- The angle and pitch of the panels have to be correct to insure efficiency.
- It is possible to place panels on the sides of some houses.
- Solar products that are designed to look like regular roofing tiles will be another option. However, the current tiles are shiny and black and would not be compatible with most roofing products. The forecast is for them to be much improved in two to three years.
- We looked into the potential of a solar farm in I'On and learned that this has to be done before a development is begun in order to have all the required connections in place. It also would have required four to five acres of property for a farm.
- The cost of a residential installation averages \$30,000 to \$40,000. In SC there are two possible tax credits for homeowners who pay taxes and opt to use solar. One is a Federal credit of 30% and the other is a state credit of 25%. These credits would save almost half of the total cost.
- I'On's only energy source is Dominion which gives them a monopoly in this area. This company is likely to raise rates as time goes on.

Solar energy is a fast-evolving field, both in technology and regulatory requirements. We will continue to monitor and communicate developments.

If you are not in favor of this location being licensed as a liquor store but cannot meet the objection requirements, you can <u>sign</u> <u>this petition</u> which will be carried to the hearing by titleholders who are planning to attend.
