

MAY HAPPENINGS WITH THE I'ON TRUST



- Having an organization like the TRUST adds value to property in I'On




UPDATED INFORMATIONI'On Civic Parcel CV-9 and Proposed Use as an Active Cemetery

National Hurricane Center Predicts 6 – 10 Hurricanes in 2025 Atlantic Hurricane Season

June 1st marked the official start of the 2025 hurricane season. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) is predicting a normal Atlantic hurricane season this year, with 13 – 19 named storms, 6-10 hurricanes and 3-5 major hurricanes.

Now is a good time to create a plan for you and your family and to review the 2025 Hurricane Guide from Charleston County (<u>CLICK HERE</u>). The South Carolina Emergency Management Division (SCEMD) also provides useful hurricane preparedness information on their website at <u>www.hurricane.sc</u> and on the SC Emergency Manager app.

We also highly encourage all residents to sign up for the Town of Mount Pleasant alerts, as you will receive the most current emergency alerts and updates on topics such as trash pick-up, road closures, etc. You can sign up for alerts by visiting the Town's website at www.tompsc.com. Hover over the "I Want To" tab, then select "Subscribe" / "Notify Me" and you can select your email preferences and sign up for their alerts.

The Seasonal Shift from Spring to Summer: How our Community Garden Changes



The community garden in late May is healthy and lush as gardeners regularly water and care for their plots

In coastal South Carolina we are fortunate to have a mild climate that allows us to grow a wide variety of plants and to be outdoors in our gardens most of the year. Many community gardeners take advantage of this in our garden planning. We plant cold-hardy greens and garlic that grow over the winter and through the spring. In the spring additional crops are added including lettuce, chard, parsley, flowers, peas, and strawberries. As temperatures rise and days lengthen, warmweather tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, basil, beans, and eggplant fill any empty spots. The goal is to fully utilize our garden space throughout the growing season. As many experienced gardeners have found, Nature abhors bare soil; it will be filled by weeds if not by plants you choose to grow.

Since our garden opening in February, the garden has become an oasis of leafy plants and blooming flowers creating a tapestry of many colors. Beginning in late May, however, we face a period of transition as spring changes to summer.



Many of the cool-weather crops that we have been enjoying are now bolting and going to seed as their productive time draws to a close. Happily, their flowers are feeding the myriad pollinating insects, especially bees, drawn to the pollen and nectar they provide. It is a wonderful time of year to see Nature's cycles in action as both plants and animals respond in a choreographed dance to the change in seasons.

Walking around the garden, you will see that planting choices are diverse and every plot has a story to tell. A few still have maturing cool-weather crops planted during middle spring. Similar crops planted earlier by other gardeners are now old, tattered, and bolting. Elsewhere, there are a range of plants including post-peak chards or bolting kale growing alongside warm-weather crops that will continue to develop through the summer. In some cases, the gardener's preference for mostly flowers, herbs, or tomatoes is reflected.

Cross your fingers that these beautiful spring lettuces, kale, and carrots will continue to mature before the weather becomes too hot for them

Although most of what we grow are familiar favorites, the most eye-catching plants are the imposing artichokes and their cousin cardoons, usually grown as ornamentals for their striking foliage and magenta flowers. Both of these plants are so popular that each year more gardeners are growing them.

As our garden reveals, one of the best things about gardening is that it allows you to choose among a large variety of vegetables, herbs, flowers, and fruit.

Although it is convenient to buy the limited range of transplants offered by local nurseries, the longer a person gardens, the more adventuresome they often become and eager to explore novel alternatives. A sure sign of this is finding yourself going online or poring through catalogs to discover exciting unfamiliar plants to try. This is the ultimate period of transition.

I'ON'S BUTTERFLY GARDEN





Action in the Butterfly Garden is Picking Up as Spring Shifts to Summer

The butterfly garden in the spring provides vital food for early emerging pollinators and, as the photo to the left shows, there are some lovely plants now blooming. However, they are mainly attracting native bees, not many butterflies.

Although only a few butterflies are being reported, more are beginning to arrive. Among the most anticipated butterflies are the iconic monarchs, whose yearly migration out of Mexico begins in early March. After leaving their overwintering sites and reaching North America, they lay eggs then die. Their offspring are the generation that continues the journey north arriving in South Carolina in April and May. The first ones recorded at the butterfly garden over the years arrived in middle-late April, as was true again this year. Although their numbers are still small, they are increasing and sightings have become more widespread here and around the state. We currently have at least one monarch laying eggs on our milkweed, the only plant their caterpillars can eat. To help these endangered butterflies survive, we grow milkweed in various locations around the garden.

Another notable butterfly seen recently at the garden is the American lady. It was observed while photos of some of the prettiest flowers now blooming in our garden were taken for this newsletter.

By the time the July newsletter comes out, the butterfly garden will have been transformed by a larger number of flowering plants. The number and variety of butterflies and other pollinators will increase as well to take advantage of the food, shelter, and host plants (on which insects reproduce) our garden provides them. We hope many of you will visit the garden to enjoy it all.

Purple Martins Are Our Best New Neighbors

If you've looked up recently and noticed sleek, graceful birds darting through the sky with a cheerful chirp, you're not alone. Our newest neighbors—the Purple Martins—have officially moved in, and they're already making a big impression!

Purple Martins are the largest members of the swallow family in North America. While many people mistakenly believe they eat mosquitoes, these birds actually target larger flying insects. And that's still great news for us—Purple Martins help control some of the most bothersome and even destructive pests in our environment.

Purple Martins eat invasive red fire ants—a notorious problem throughout the South and Midwest. They also consume termites, beetles, and other insects that no one wants near their home.

But their presence in our neighborhood is more than just convenient, it's vital. Since 1966, the Purple Martin population has declined by roughly 40%, largely due to the loss of their natural nesting sites in dead or hollowed-out trees. East of the Rocky Mountains, they now rely almost entirely on human-provided housing to breed and survive.

Thanks to a growing interest in bird-friendly habitats, our neighbor Charlie Miller, installed this impressive martin house on Eastlake a few years ago and now these birds are finding it and having their babies. Designed specifically to attract Purple Martins, it features multiple compartments and is positioned high above the ground in an open area—just the way these birds like it.

The best part? Charlie has graciously agreed to take care of all the upkeep. His goal was simple but meaningful: to provide an environmentally friendly way to support the community

Let's all take a moment to appreciate the beauty they bring and the people who help make our community a better place—one birdhouse at a time.


