

# It's Late October: Where are the Monarchs?

We have been eagerly watching for the monarch migration to reach South Carolina and the butterfly garden, but there are few monarchs currently in our garden or reported from other South Carolina locations. One way I check to see if the number of monarchs has increased in our area is to visit one of my favorite locations, the Pitt Street Bridge Park. In past years I have seen dozens of monarchs at a time crossing from Mt. Pleasant to Sullivan's Island, many flying overhead with others flocking on the numerous groundsel plants to refuel on flower nectar. As of October 20, as I write this newsletter, there are no monarchs to be seen at this location.

As another check, I visited the butterfly garden to count monarchs. I saw only two, one a tattered adult that I saw a week earlier. There was also a fresh monarch enjoying nectar from various milkweed flowers, but two monarchs do not indicate the migration is upon us. Bottom line: it will be later in October and into November before the migration arrives; be sure to watch for a report in the December newsletter. Better yet, visit local coastal areas and the butterfly garden in November to witness this magical phenomenon in person.

Luckily, in anticipation of the monarch migration a couple of other Team BG members and I have been spending more time than usual checking on butterflies at the garden.

In the process we have observed many interesting visitors (see some of the non-butterflies in the October newsletter). Currently, the Gulf fritillary and cloudless sulphur are the most numerous butterflies; the buckeye is less often seen at the garden but several were counted on various flowers. All of these butterflies are common in the southeast from late summer to late fall and survive by migrating south like monarchs before freezing weather occurs.

Of special note are two butterflies that are uncommon this far north. The rarest is the queen, a butterfly we have never seen in the garden before. The queen is a relative of monarchs, but is normally found in Florida and other more tropical regions. Another butterfly from farther south that has been visiting the garden for several years is the zebra longwing. As delightful as it is to see these butterflies this time of year, neither queen or zebra longwing butterflies are migratory and will die if they remain here when freezing temperatures arrive. Come see them while they are with us along with the many other butterflies at the garden.

# Mark Your Calendar: Sign Up for a Community Garden Plot Beginning January 1, 2026

It is hard to believe that almost a year has gone by since the community garden began its 2025 season. Despite the period of unusually hot, dry weather that made gardening more challenging, for those who persevered an abundance of juicy tomatoes, flavorful herbs, beans, peppers and other tasty vegetables have been grown and harvested; some such as peppers are still producing. Most gardeners also planted a diversity of flowers with zinnias being most preferred, and for good reason. Zinnias are easy to grow and put on a color show all summer and into the fall; they add not only beauty to the garden but attract bees and butterflies even now to pollinate our crops. We are now in the process of converting our plots to cold-hardy brassicas, sugar snap peas, turnips, lettuce, and other crops. Those gardeners who continue growing can look forward to reaping the rewards of their efforts for many months ahead.

Does growing your own organic vegetables, herbs, and flowers sounds appealing? If so, you will soon have an opportunity to get a plot for 2026.

Gardening is not only a source of nutritious food or beautiful flowers, it is also a rewarding and healthy outdoor activity for family or friends to enjoy together. The community garden is conveniently located in the field on Eastlake Rd (off Mathis Ferry Rd), in the same area as I'On's Butterfly Garden. Many of us return year after year and encourage new members to discover what several enthusiastic gardeners have said is "one of the best things about living in I'On".


#### Signups for 2026 begin on January 1.

The garden's 27 raised beds are 5' x 8' in size and available on a first come, first serve basis to I'On residents. For only \$75, plots are amended annually and mulched pathways, perimeter fencing, straw mulch, and water are all included. Garden and planting guides are also provided along with timely information throughout the year. The garden is open for planting in mid-February, and our growing season is year-round so you can enjoy your summer tomatoes and winter greens as well. Sign up individually, as a family, or partner with a friend.



# I'On Assembly Seeks Candidates

Each January during the annual meeting, the I'On Assembly Board of Trustees elects three to four new board members to serve a two-year term. For the 2026-2027 terms, there will be (3) two-year term positions and one (1) one-year position for Board seats available to candidates.

Your current Board of Trustees encourages you to get involved in the future direction of I'On by running for a board seat or encouraging a neighbor to get involved. Board members are available between now and the January election to discuss the job responsibilities and what it is like to serve on the Board.

Serving on the board and volunteering for one of I'On's standing committees are great ways get involved in the future direction of our neighborhood. While the time commitment varies based on issues which may arise, board members can expect to spend roughly two hours a week. The primary responsibility for all Board members is to have an open mind when making decisions in the best interest of all 761 titleholders.

Joining the board requires filling out a <u>board application</u> by November 30th, so packets with ballots can be sent to Assembly members in December. Voting occurs in January and ends at our annual meeting in January.
