For those of you unfamiliar with this wonderful I'On tradition, the project began in 2004 and now over 500 bricks have been engraved surrounding the fountain in Perseverance Square.

Names of I'On residents' loved ones, dear friends, and beloved pets along with those who have made a difference in someone's life or who have contributed to the community can be found on the bricks.

Perseverance Square is a uniquely wonderful place in I'On, shared and enjoyed by all in remembrance of those special people that have gone before and the ones we love and cherish in our lives today.

Just in time for Christmas, orders can be placed now through March 31st, 2026. Engraved bricks will be installed in May.

Now that the COVID-pandemic with its resulting supply chain and construction disruptions is in the rearview mirror, the IDC will be fully enforcing provisions in the CCRs relating to project completion.

Article IV Section 105 in the CCRs provides: "...Unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Design Committee, all elements of proposed improvements for which plans are approved hereunder shall be completed within one year after the approval..."

If there are extenuating circumstances about your project requiring an extension, you must reach out in writing to Kristine Mobley (Neighbor Design Coordinator) for review and approval of an extension. Kristine's email address is: idc_ion@ravenelassociates.com

Also, all IDC projects require a deposit (with the exception of maintenance and repair), ranging from \$100 - \$10,000 depending on the project's scope, with some projects requiring two deposits (completion deposit and contractor deposit). It is the homeowner's responsibility to request a final IDC inspection no later than ninety (90) days after the project's completion. Please notify Kristine once your project has concluded and submit a completed Final Inspection & Deposit Refund Request Form.

Over the last couple of months there has been an increase in very large 18-wheeler and semi-trucks coming into the neighborhood. As a reminder, the community has restrictions on trucks due to the tree-lined and narrow streets, making it difficult for these large trucks to maneuver. Please remind your contractors, delivery drivers, moving companies, etc. that trucks more than 45 feet with large cabs are not allowed in l'On. It is the owners responsibility to inform their delivery drivers, contractors, etc. of this restriction.

I'ON COMMUNITY GARDEN

Need a Special Holiday Present? How about a Plot in the Community Garden! by April Gordon

Give yourself, your family, or a friend a special present that lasts all year: a community garden plot where you can grow vegetables, fruit, herbs, and flowers all year long! Abundant research shows the benefits of gardening for individuals and communities. These include: exercise; better physical, mental, and cognitive health; improved diet; mindfulness and connection to nature; more social interaction with neighbors and family; support for the environment (pollinators, birds, soil health); and benefits for kids. Registration for plots for 2026 begins on January 1. Contact April Gordon (at iongarden@gmail.com) for a registration form. Plots are limited in number and assigned on a first come/ first serve basis. So enjoy your holiday cheer but don't forget to reserve your plot. Here's what you get for \$75 per year:

- a 5' x 8' raised bed garden amended every spring
- a sunny location with water provided, mulched pathways around plots, and a perimeter fence to protect the area from unwanted critters
- a startup guide containing garden rules, planting information, and other helpful information and suggestions
- garden newsletters with cutting edge information on gardening, current happenings in the garden, and how to deal with garden problems

Our garden philosophy is that growing a garden is more than producing a delicious ripe tomato or a beautiful dahlia. It is a chance to meet, learn from, and form friendships with your neighbors; an opportunity to involve the entire family in learning where food comes from and to enjoy healthy food (and other plants) you have grown yourself; and being out in nature and appreciating the environment that sustains us.

BUTTERFLY GARDEN

Meet the New Native Plant Extension of the Butterfly Garden

Chinese privet had formed a thick hedge next to the garden fence and created dense shade in parts of the garden area jeopardizing the growth of garden plants

After many months of research and planning, the native plant extension of the butterfly garden was planted on November 12. The area, located outside the community garden fence on Eastlake Road, had become overgrown with invasive Chinese privets that had crowded out most of the other plants originally growing there and were so large their branches were shading out parts of the community and butterfly gardens.

With the support of the HOA, plans were made to eliminate the privets and replace them with smaller native plants that would not intrude on the community and butterfly gardens and would be consistent with their goals of promoting healthy biodiversity and other environmental benefits in the garden area. Another part of the plan is to educate the larger community about the importance of native plants to the environment and demonstrate how all of us, neighborhoods and individual

homeowners alike, can incorporate native plants into our landscapes to not only help the environment but to create beauty as well.

Next steps include helping the new mostly perennial plants establish themselves over the winter months so they can begin to grow and thrive once warmer spring weather returns. Additional plants will also be added as needed along with interpretive signs and educational materials for those who visit the garden area. This will be a continuing project over the years, but we are off to an exciting beginning.


